Lee University piano alumni have gone on to start careers as performers, freelancers, teachers, or church musicians both here in the US and in Asia, and some decide to continue their studies at prestigious graduate institutions. Recently, Lee graduates were accepted to Doctor of Musical Arts programs with full-tuition support at Indiana University, the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music, Stony Brook University in New York, the University of Georgia, and the University of Miami's Frost School of Music, as well as Artist Diploma programs at Longy School of Music at Bard College, the Mannes School, and Georgia State University.

While working towards their degree, Lee piano students are encouraged and supported by the faculty to explore extracurricular performance opportunities, competitions, and employment/volunteer work to contribute to building our musical community. Several of our students serve as staff pianists for local churches, others work as piano instructors and staff pianists in community schools. Piano students also perform vital functions for the operation of the School of Music here at Lee, serving as accompanists for other music students' lessons, juries, and recitals, as tutors for piano proficiency classes, and as ensemble pianists for vocal and instrumental groups.

Recent Lee piano students have been recognized in state, national, and international competitions, including prizes in the Memphis International Piano Competition, the Music Teachers National Association Young Artist State Competition, the Nashville International Piano Competition, Tennessee Tech University Young Artist Competition, University of Tennessee Chattanooga Piano Arts Competition, Charleston International Music Competition and others.

In addition to intensive study with our own piano faculty, Lee piano students have the opportunities to work with renowned pianists from around the world right here on campus through programs like the Presidential Concert Series and the Performing Arts Series.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS



Pianist Christopher Harding maintains a flourishing international performance career, generating acclaim and impressing audiences and critics alike with his substantive interpretations and pianistic mastery. He has given frequent solo, concerto, and chamber music performances in venues as far-flung as the Kennedy Center and Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C.; Suntory Hall in Tokyo; the National Theater Concert Hall in Taipei; the Jack Singer Concert Hall in Calgary; and halls and festival appearances in Newfoundland, Israel, Romania, and China. His concerto performances have included concerts with the National Symphony and the Saint Louis

Symphony Orchestras, the San Angelo and Santa Barbara Symphonies, and the Tokyo City Philharmonic, working with such conductors as Andrew Sewell, Eric Zhou, Taijiro limori, Gisele Ben-Dor, Fabio Marchetti, Randall Craig Fleisher, John DeMain, Ron Spiegelman, Daniel Alcott, and Darryl One, among others. His chamber music and duo collaborations have included internationally renowned artists such as clarinetist Karl Leister, flautist Andras Adorjan, and members of the St. Lawrence and Ying String Quartets, in addition to frequent projects with his distinguished faculty colleagues at the University of Michigan. He has recorded solo and chamber music CDs for the Equilibrium and Brevard Classics labels. He has additionally edited and published critical editions and recordings of works by Claude Debussy (Children's Corner, Arabesques, and shorter works) and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (Viennese Sonatinas) for the Schirmer Performance Editions published by Hal Leonard.

Harding has presented master classes and lecture recitals in universities across the United States and Asia, as well as in Israel and Canada. His most recent tours to Taiwan, Hong Kong, and mainland China included presentations and master classes at Hong Kong Baptist University, National Taiwan Normal University, SooChow University, the National Taiwan University of Education, and conservatories and universities in Beijing (Central and China Conservatories), Tianjin, Shanghai, Hefei, Guangzhou, Shenyang, Dalien, and Chongqing. He has performed and lectured numerous times in Seoul, including lecture recitals and classes at Seoul National University, Ewha Women's University, and Dong Duk University. He has served extended tours as a Fulbright senior specialist at the Sichuan Conservatory of Music in Chengdu, China (2008), and also at Seoul National University (2011). While teaching at SNU, he simultaneously held a Special Chair in Piano at Ewha Womans University.

In addition to teaching undergraduate and graduate piano performance and chamber music at the University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance, Harding also serves on the faculty of the Indiana University Summer Piano Academy and is a frequent guest artist and teacher at the MasterWorks Festival in Winona Lake, IN. Recent summer festivals have also included the Chautauqua Institution in New York and the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival in Tampa, Florida.

Harding was born of American parents in Munich, Germany, and raised in Northern Virginia. His collegiate studies were with Menahem Pressler and Nelita True. Prior to college, he worked for 10 years with Milton Kidd at the American University Department of Performing Arts Preparatory Division, where he was trained in the traditions of Tobias Matthay. He has taken 25 first prizes in national and international competitions and in 1999 was awarded the special "Mozart Prize" at the Cleveland International Piano Competition, given for the best performance of a composition by Mozart. His current recording projects include the Brahms viola/clarinet sonatas and the clarinet trio, with clarinetist Dan Gilbert, violist Stephen Boe, and cellist Yeonjin Kim.



Thomas Lanners has appeared as a solo and collaborative pianist and clinician throughout the U.S. and abroad, presenting his New York solo debut in Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in 2004. His performances have been broadcast nationally and internationally on programs such as American Public Media's *Performance Today*, BBC3 in London and RTÉ Radio 1's Sunday Miscellany in Ireland, among many others.

Thomas has performed, presented master classes, and given lectures on various musical topics as a guest artist throughout the United States, in Mexico, Canada, Europe and Asia. In recent summers he has served on the faculties of the Shanghai International Piano Festival and Institute (and will do so again in 2021) and the AmiCaFest Piano

Festival in Sicily. Within the past three years, he's presented master classes at Yonsei University in Seoul, and in China at the Sichuan, Shanghai and Zhejiang Conservatories, the Shanghai Conservatory Middle School, and East China and Beijing Normal Universities. Thomas gave a master class on the NYU Steinhardt School of Music's *Piano Artist Master Class Series* in 2012.

Other institutions he has visited as a guest artist include the Eastman School of Music, the Universities of Texas-Austin, Colorado-Boulder, North Texas, Miami, South Carolina, Oklahoma, Western Ontario (Canada), and Iowa; Northwestern, Syracuse, Louisiana State, Southern Methodist, and Baylor Universities.

His latest recording, *Ned Rorem: Piano Works, Volume 2*, was released worldwide by Centaur Records. The disc received great critical praise, including this from the *Cleveland Plain Dealer:* "Thomas Lanners brings exceptional detail and urgency to the repertoire, taking as much care with inner voices as he does with arching statements. Grade: A." An *American Record Guide* review of Thomas' previous CD, *Ned Rorem: The Three Piano Sonatas*, read: "Anyone who cares about mainstream 20th Century piano music should seek out this superlative recording." In a review of Lanners' recording of Leonard Bernstein's solo piano works, Jed Distler wrote for *ClassicsToday.com:* "All told, Lanners' loving mastery easily holds its own in any company. Warmly recommended." His championing of American piano music was the topic of an interview article in a 2010 issue of *Fanfare*.

He is an active writer on musical topics, with several feature articles having been published in *American Music Teacher*, among others. Always in demand as a clinician, he has presented many sessions at national and international conferences, including those of the Music Teachers National Association and the China International Piano Pedagogy Conference, hosted by the Shanghai Conservatory. Thomas has served as a juror in numerous international piano competitions.

Lanners received his Master's and Doctoral degrees from the Eastman School as a student of Barry Snyder. He also studied under John Perry at the Aspen Music Festival and Jerome Lowenthal at the Music Academy of the West. Designated the 2014 *Distinguished Music Teacher* by the Oklahoma Music Teachers Association, he currently serves as Professor of Piano at Oklahoma State University.



South Korean-New Zealand pianist Jonathan Jung concertizes regularly across the USA, New Zealand, Australia, Thailand, Vietnam, China, South Korea, and Japan. He has been featured as a Guest Artist at the Texas State International Piano Festival and Brevard Summer Music Festival. Jonathan has performed with the Eastman Philharmonic Orchestra, Korean Philharmonic Orchestra of New Zealand, University of Auckland Symphony Orchestra, and Auckland Youth Orchestra. Jonathan received prizes in Kerikeri Piano Competition, Eastman Concerto Competition, Kapiti Coast National Piano Competition, and Christchurch National Piano Concerto

Competition. His solo recitals and concerto performances have been recorded and broadcasted by Radio New Zealand and World TV.

As a composer, Jonathan has premiered and performed his own compositions at Carnegie Hall, University of Southern Mississippi, Tulane University, Hatch Recital Hall, and Brevard Music Center. In a review of his recent Carnegie Hall Recital, New York Concert Review wrote, "[Mr. Jung's] The four pieces are (no title), Illuminate, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei. There is a strong French influence in the first three; the first two have striking Debussyian qualities, and the third reminds one of Milhaud. The piano part is virtuosic; there is no "hack-in-the-back" anywhere to be found in any of the selections. The fourth piece, the Agnus Dei, was much more individualistic, with a mournful sound that was truly moving." Jonathan enjoys writing music for all instruments and he is a devoted chamber musician.

Jonathan completed a Master of Music Degree and Bachelor of Music (Honours) Degree with First Class at the University of Auckland, New Zealand. In 2009, he received an invitation to study in the USA to complete a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree (2016), Master of Arts in Theory Pedagogy Degree (2015), and Master of Music Degree (2011) at the Eastman School of Music. His academic mentors include Barry Snyder, Rae de Lisle, Read Gainsford, Douglas Humpherys, Thomas Schumacher, Steven Laitz, Elizabeth Marvin, Katherine Ciesinski, David Temperley and Matthew Brown.

Jonathan has a passion for collecting rare historical music recordings of the early twentieth century. He now combines this passion with his academic interest: music theory and music analysis. Jonathan's current research is on tempo rubato—an in-depth comparative study between nineteenth- and twentieth-century pianists' interpretations. His thesis, titled "Structural Hearing of Rubato," is a pedagogical study of tempo fluctuation in music performance, focusing on motives, counterpoint, and harmonization. Jonathan has presented his theoretical work at the MTNA and College Music Society conferences.

Jonathan is a dedicated teacher and has taught Applied Piano, Music Theory, Aural Skills, and Class Piano sequences at Southwestern Oklahoma State University and Jones County Junior College. Starting Fall 2017, he joined Lee University as Assistant Professor of Piano to continue his teaching, research, and performance career. Jonathan is the Director of Lee University International Piano Festival and Competition (https://www.leeupianofestival.com) and he recruits pianists nationally and internationally. Outside his teaching duties, Jonathan enjoys playing the organ. He serves the music ministry as an organist at St. Luke's Episcopal Church of Cleveland TN. Jonathan's concert schedules and recordings are available on his website (https://www.joonghanjung.com).



ChoEun Lee, a native of South Korea, is an active pianist, vocal coach, and chamber musician. She has given numerous performances in Korea, the United States, Italy, Australia, New Zealand, Austria, and Taiwan; in major venues including Carnegie Hall in New York City, Ozawa Hall in Tanglewood Music Center, and Harris Concert Hall in Aspen Music Festival. She has worked extensively in recitals and masterclasses with renowned musicians, including Stephanie Blythe, Jake Heggie, Martin Katz, Anne Sofie von Otter, Christine Schäfer, Dawn Upshaw, and Linda Watson. She was a pianist in Opera gala concerts in the Opera Theatre and Music Festival of Lucca. Italy.

where she worked with Donna Brunsma, Gianfranco Cosmi, and Rolando Russo. She was twice invited to Tanglewood Music Festival and has been named a recipient of the Grace B. Jackson Prize. One of her performances in Seiji Ozawa Hall was broadcasted on WAMC. She was also invited to the Emerging Artist Fellowship Program in Fall Island Vocal Arts Seminar in Potsdam (NY), directed by Stephanie Blythe and Alan Smith. Since 2016, she has been invited as a repetitor to the American Institute of Musical Studies (AIMS) in Graz.

ChoEun Lee, as a harpsichordist, has performed many Baroque music concerts, and she is also passionate about discovering and performing contemporary classical music and vocal chamber music. She has appeared many times at the Grandin Vocal Chamber Music Festival and one of the core artists in the LotusFlower New Music Project. She has premiered various works and has worked with many current composers, including John Harbison, Michael Gandolfi, Jake Heggie, Thomas Pasatieri, John Plant, and Chinary Ung. She world-premiered co-commissioned vocal chamber music, The Ocean of Eternity, for soprano, saxophone, and piano by Lori Laitman, in the National Opera Center in New York City.

As an active clinician, ChoEun Lee has given numerous masterclasses and presentations at universities and associations, including at Chattanooga Music Teachers Association (CMTA), Covenant College, Georgia College, Yeungnam University (Korea), Seoul Cyber University (Korea), Taitung University (Taiwan) and the National Taipei Normal University (Taiwan). She has been invited to the Annual UTC Piano Arts Festival as a guest artist and competition adjudicator. She was invited as a guest panel to CollabFest at the University of Southern California and the University of North Texas.

ChoEun Lee holds a B.M. from Kyungwon University, an M.M. from the University of Cincinnati, and a D.M.A from the University of Southern California. She is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, the national music honor society, and a recipient of the Gwendolyn Koldofsky Keyboard Collaborative Arts scholarship four times. Previously she taught at California State University, San Bernardino, and served as a vice-president of CAPMT Riverside-San Bernardino Chapter. She currently serves in the leadership team of the International Keyboard Collaborative Arts Society (IKCAS) and the Program Committee at the Chattanooga Music Teachers Association (CMTA), and co-sponsors the Chattanooga Area Collegiate Chapter (CACC). ChoEun Lee is a director of LeeU Collab Music and teaches at Lee University as an assistant professor in collaborative piano and vocal coaching. (www.ChoEunLee.com)



Phillip Thomas is an educator, performer, and university administrator with a variety of scholarly interests. A year after graduating summa cum laude from Lee College (now Lee University), he completed the master's degree in piano performance from the Peabody Conservatory; his major teachers were George Walker and Julio Esteban. Thomas later completed the Ph.D. degree in Music History from the College-Conservatory of Music of the University of Cincinnati, where he was the recipient of a full-tuition scholarship and an assistantship in Music Theory.

His dissertation was entitled Music for One or More Alternately Tuned Acoustic Pianos, 1920-1993: Trends in Melody, Harmony, and Technique. While there, he studied harpsichord with Eiji Hashimoto, a noted performer, conductor, and editor.

Thomas has served as adjudicator for a variety of competitions on the local, regional, and international levels. His students often receive the highest ratings; some have won their respective divisions. Thomas is listed in the Who's Who Among American Teachers and is a member of the American Musicological Society, the College Music Society, and Historical Keyboard Society of North America.

In 1996, Thomas established Lee University's Chamber Orchestra, after serving as founding conductor of a community string orchestra for several years. He studied conducting at the Institute Provençe-Aubagne in France with Yves Cohen, a student of Leonard Bernstein and Seiji Ozawa. Thomas led the ensemble in performances of masterworks, light classics, and other genres; a study tour to Germany and Austria; and a two recording projects. In the same period, Thomas began serving as a department chair in the School of Music at Lee. It boasts a highly-qualified faculty of some 20 members, who teach courses in music theory and history, church music, and music business.

Previously, Thomas had a long tenure as keyboardist for the Chattanooga Symphony Orchestra. He also served as board member for the Tennessee Music Teachers Association and Chattanooga Youth Symphony. Thomas was also selected to review several college textbooks, including the second edition of Douglass Seaton's Ideas and Styles in the Western Musical Tradition, published by McGraw-Hill. For many years, he was staff pianist for the Mount Paran North Church of God just outside Atlanta, Georgia.

Most recently, Thomas has studied with harpsichordist Arthur Haas, a performer and recording artist, who teaches in the Early Music Program at The Julliard School. Thomas lives in Cleveland, Tennessee, with his wife Dale, a talented soprano and music educator. They have one daughter, Shannon, a professional violinist and university professor.

Thomas Austria Born and raised in Wilmington, NC, Thomas Austria enjoys going to the beach and occasionally plays piano at his home parish. He started piano lessons at age seven. For the last three years he has studied piano with Dr. Dmitri Vorobiev at UNCSA. In 2018, he was the only middle schooler to play at UNCG Piano Day. Later that year, he was one of few selected to perform at final evening recital for UNCG music camp. He participated in the 2019 Lee University Piano Festival. He learned to play bassoon in middle school during which he participated at all-state competitions. He has continued his bassoon studies at UNCSA under

tutelage of Professor Saxton Rose. He has been bassoonist for Winston-Salem Youth Orchestra and has received a scholarship to attend the Glickman-Popkin Bassoon Camp this summer. Thomas once received an award for excellence in music theory during a UNCW music camp.



Korean born pianist **Han Sol Jeong** moved to Christchurch, New Zealand at age four, starting lessons at the age of ten. He received his Bachelor of Music (Honors) at the Yong Siew Toh Conservatory of Music with Professor Thomas Hecht on a full scholarship. He furthered his studies at Indiana University with Distinguished Professor André Watts and received his Master of Music. Currently he is doing a Performer Diploma at Indiana University, continuing his studies with Professor Watts. Han Sol has been part of the winning ensemble of the NZCT Chamber Music Contest

Christchurch District 2012-2013 and has received the KBB Award at the National Finals at both the 2012 and 2013 contests. He has appeared as concerto soloist with the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Symphony Orchestra and the Risingholme Orchestra playing works by Gershwin and Schumann. In the 2017 National Piano and Violin Competition in Singapore, he was placed 3rd and got to play Beethoven's Emperor Concerto with members of the Singapore Symphony Orchestra.



Xinyu Li, born in Henan, China, won the First Prize of the 1st Yamaha Chinese Piano Competition youth group in the Yunnan area. She was invited to perform in Meng Ming Wei Concert Hall, Tsinghua University for the Yamaha Competition of the national group. 
